Wells Fargo had a first ranking fixed and floating charge over the Company's assets and were repaid in full shortly following our appointment.

Rutland holds second ranking security over the Company's assets and on our appointment was owed £102m inclusive of accrued interest. To date, Rutland has received distributions totalling £14.5m. We estimate that Rutland will receive a further and final distribution; however, they will suffer a shortfall on their security.

On leaving, all employees received their wages payments in full as well as any payments for holiday accrued but not taken in accordance with the Company's holiday policy. As such, we do not consider there to be any preferential creditors.

In December 2019, a first and final dividend was paid to unsecured creditors from the prescribed part at a rate of 1.04%. This was a better result than the less than 1% originally estimated. There will be no further distribution to unsecured creditors.

When we last reported, the key outstanding matters in the administration were as follows:

- Finalise insurance matters;
- Conclude the Company's legal claim in relation to credit card charges;
- Submit a final VAT return;
- Make a final distribution to the secured creditor; and
- Deal with closure matters including drafting and issuing the final progress report, closure of our internal systems, obtaining clearances from third parties and removal of the Joint Administrators' bond.

This report provides an update on these key outstanding matters.

Progress since we last reported

In our previous report we outlined a number of tasks we needed to do before the administration could be brought to an end. They fell under the following categories.

Properties

Together with our solicitors, we have continued to agree to surrender leases by operation of law, or alternatively by formal deed. In the period 17 leases were either surrendered or expired, bringing the total to 185. Conversely, the leases for 34 properties remain in place and we continue to deal with any surrender requests received. However, these leases being in place will not prevent the closure of the administration in due course.

We still have public liability insurance in place for the properties where the leases haven't been surrendered or expired. During the period, we began reconciling the insurance position with our insurers. We will settle any refunds due or amounts owed to our insurers in due course. The current cost of insuring the remaining properties is c£8.5k for a 6 month period. However, this may be offset by any refunds due and will also reduce as further leases are surrendered or expire.

Business rates

It came to our attention in the previous period that a historical error by a local council may have led to further business rates recoveries. We are pleased to report that in this period we recovered a further £19.7k in business rates refunds. Currently the total value of business rates refunds stands at £208k. During the period we paid £4.4k to agents in relation to the work involved with recovering these business rates refunds. We understand from our business rates agents, all refunds have now been collected.

Tax and VAT

During the period, our VAT team continued to deal with the Company's VAT affairs. A number of VAT refunds that were being withheld by HMRC were repaid to the Company during the period and are shown on the attached receipts and payments account at Appendix A. As such, we have been able to reconcile our VAT accounts and are now comfortable that all VAT due from HMRC has been paid, and that there is no VAT due from the Company to HMRC (other than what is currently in the VAT control account).

Despite being comfortable that no funds were owed to HMRC, the R&P in our previous report showed the VAT control account having a payable balance of £1.4m. As part of the reconciliation exercise in this period, we have reallocated the VAT payable balance from the VAT control account to 'Trading Sales' in the trading account. The discrepancy was a result of using the Company's systems during the trading period, where VAT was paid directly to HMRC. As such, a payable balance was provisioned for when the income from trading sales was transferred to the administration bank account, despite already being paid.

As we have deregistered for VAT, we will submit a final VAT reclaim by way of a VAT426 form before the closure of the case to recover any further VAT due to the Company.

We have previously obtained corporation tax clearance and HMRC confirmed they had no objection to the closure of the administration.

Creditors

As previously reported, any unclaimed unsecured dividends were paid to the Insolvency Service Unclaimed Dividends Account. Any creditors who did not bank their dividend cheque must now contact the Insolvency Service directly to receive payment.

Legal Claim

We have continued to monitor the progress of the Company's claim in relation to credit card charges, which is being dealt with by a third party as part of a group action, and they have continued to keep us apprised of their work towards a possible settlement. During the period, an extension of time for service of the claim form was granted until 8 December 2022, pending the outcome of a Supreme Court hearing of appeals in similar claims to assist the parties, and the Court, in reaching a conclusion in the litigation. As such, it is highly unlikely the claim will be settled in the next period. However, as previously reported, Rutland is the only creditor with an economic interest in the outcome of this claim and any funds received from this claim will be paid to Rutland under the terms of their security. Rutland is supportive of the strategy for continuing to keep the administration open pending the conclusion of this claim.

As the time to resolve this claim is materially uncertain, we are still exploring options which might enable the administration to be concluded while the claim remains in progress. However, it is likely that we will continue to pursue the claim in the administration.

Extension of the administration

Due to the ongoing legal claim mentioned above, the administrators sought a further extension of the administration. During the period, the court approved the extension and the administration is now due to expire on 27 February 2023.

Changes of administrator

Toby Scott Underwood, one of the previous joint administrators, has retired from the firm. To make sure that outstanding issues in the administration continue to be pursued, an application was made to the Court to remove him and appoint Jane Steer as joint administrator. Jane Steer is licensed in the United Kingdom to act as an insolvency practitioner by the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales.

The application was granted and so Jane Steer replaced Toby Scott Underwood as joint administrator with effect from 30 November 2021. Toby Scott Underwood will be released from all liability in respect of his conduct as administrator with effect from 28 days from the date of this report. Creditors have 28 days from receiving this notice to apply to Court to vary or discharge the Court order.

Investigations and actions

Nothing has come to our attention during the period under review to suggest that we need to do any more work in line with our duties under the Company Directors' Disqualification Act 1986 and Statement of Insolvency Practice No.2.

Appendix B: Expenses

Expenses are amounts properly payable by us as joint administrators from the estate, but excludes our fees and distributions to creditors.

These include disbursements which are expenses met by and reimbursed to an office holder in connection with an insolvency appointment.

The rate for services provided by the Joint Administrators' own firm (Category 2 expenses) may periodically rise (for example to cover annual inflationary cost increases) over the period of the administration. All other disbursements to be charged at cost.
