

What is a stereotype?

- Stereotypes are beliefs or assumptions that large groups have over people or things with a certain characteristic.
- These are often untrue or unfair.
- A common example of a stereotype is that girls should play with dolls and boys with trucks.
- Stereotypes can also be positive, for example women are caring or Northerner's are friendly.
